## Leytonstone and Housing

In 1914 only 79 new houses were built mainly due to a shortage of sites rather than deliberate policy. The council reported that even so there was a 'sufficiency' of housing for the inhabitants.


The majority of houses in Leytonstone (75%) were rented and the council regularly inspected them to ensure landlords and tenants maintained adequate standards. This was intrusive but allowing insanitary conditions to flourish put the whole community at risk. In 1914 exactly 1644 dwellings were inspected, 15 were condemned and 1284 ordered to be repaired.

The council rates increased from 3 s to 4 s by 1915. Landlords used this to put up rents. However the 'Increase of Rent War Restrictions Act' gave tenants better protection from 1916.
